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Course Description

According to the <u>National Children's Alliance Standards for Accreditation</u>, "[a] medical evaluation holds an important place in the multidisciplinary assessment of child abuse. An accurate history is essential in making the medical diagnosis and determining appropriate treatment of child abuse." Furthermore, proper medical evaluations provide important information to support legal decisions in child abuse cases.

Medical Aspects of Child Abuse is a set of independent lessons that can be viewed individually or in conjunction with the other lessons to give the participant a general understanding of the medical aspects of different forms of child abuse. By understanding what is needed medically to diagnose and treat children for suspected child abuse and neglect, the multidisciplinary team can work together for the best outcome of the child.

Course Objectives

Students who complete these lessons successfully will be able to:

- Explain the role of the medical provider within the multidisciplinary team
- Demonstrate how to assess physical injuries that are diagnostic for abuse.
- Understand normal childhood development, including sexual development and behaviors that may be concerning for sexual abuse.



- Determine when a client requires an acute medical evaluation with forensic evidence collection and/or sexually transmitted infections prophylaxis.
- Explain other issues related to child sexual abuse, including: child sexual abuse material (pornography), drug facilitated sexual abuse, commercial sexual exploitation of children and runaway youth.

Course Format

The course is comprised of nine lessons. Each lesson is designed to take approximately fifteen minutes each. It is designed as a self-paced course and participants can view one, a few or all of the lessons as they desire.

This course will be delivered entirely online through the Midwest Regional CAC's eLearning Portal. In the eLearning Portal, students have access to all course materials and resources.
